

The Justice40 Initiative centers on environmental, racial, and economic justice for communities of color systematically affected by poverty, pollution, under-investment, and other inequities. This is the time to prioritize, resource, empower, and protect the nation's most vulnerable and historically neglected communities — when we are experiencing unprecedented environmental catastrophes such as Hurricane Ida and other climate change disasters.

The Biden-Harris administration can fulfill its executive order to ensure that 40% of federal climate investments go directly to benefit under-resourced communities.
